He will replace outgoing Councilwoman and Lido Isle resident, Diane Dixon. District 1 includes Lido Isle, the Balboa Peninsula and much of West Newport. After serving eight years on the City Council, Ms. Dixon (R) ran for and won election to the California State Assembly to represent District 72, which includes Newport Beach. Joe was named "Newport Beach Citizen of The Year" in 2020, and his passion for the City runs deep. He served on the Newport Beach Harbor Commission from 2013-2017, where he supported the efforts to create a new Harbor Department, helped jumpstart the overhaul of Title 17, and enjoyed a term as Vice Chair before joining the City's Finance Committee.

For the past four years, he has championed fiscal responsibility, pension, and debt paydown, and balanced budgets with heavy emphasis on public safety and infrastructure. His experience on both the Harbor Commission and Finance Committee has led to a well-rounded view of the needs of our City, including funding additional needs on the Harbor, responding to homelessness, and addressing basic quality-of-life services.

Joe is also former Chairman of the Board of the Newport Beach Foundation, an organization that he revitalized to raise civic awareness in young professionals. The program has graduated over 160 people, including a dozen now serving on city boards, commissions, and committees. He also serves on more than a dozen boards of directors for community and civic organizations and is the Skipper of the Commodores Club of the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce.

Three other residents were elected to Newport's City Council as well. Erik Weigand (District 3) will replace termed out Duffy Duffield, Robyn Grant (District 4) will replace termed out Kevin Muldoon and Lauren Kleiman (District 6) will replace incumbent Joy Brenner.

Power outages can be inconvenient and even deadly. Backup power is essential to keeping you and your family safe. It's important to know the causes of power outages and how to prepare for one. Listed below are the 8 major reasons for Power Outages and what you can do to be prepared.

1. Severe Weather

Severe weather is the most common cause of Power Outages. The 4 major types of severe weather to cause Power Outages are high winds, lightning, snow, and ice. It is important to stay up to date with your local weather.

2. Fallen Trees

High winds, heavy snow, and Ice are the major reasons of fallen trees. Fallen tree debris can cause random power outages when they take down utility poles or wires.

3. Automotive Vehicle Collisions

Vehicle collisions with utility poles cause power outages on a local scale. They can happen at any time and for several reasons such as reckless driving, inclement weather, impaired driving, and distracted driving. While we do not have power poles on Lido, there are power poles and power stations nearby that provide out power and make us vulnerable to these outages.

4. Equipment Failure

Electrical equipment that provides power can sometimes be defective, interrupted or worn out over time. Power supply requires complex equipment that can stop working for several reasons. It can take hours and even days to fix them and get power up and running again.

5. High Energy Demand

High energy demand tends to occur during the summertime and wintertime when air conditioning units are working overtime. This causes an excessive draw of energy that can overload the system and cause Power Outages.

6. Earthquakes

Earthquakes are unpredictable. Quakes of all sizes can cause significant amounts of damage to disrupt power supply at any time. Earthquakes can also lead to lingering threats such as fires and tsunamis if close enough to coastal areas.

7. Construction Work/ Yard Work

Excavation digging can sometimes disrupt underground cables - Even simple yard work digging has the potential of causing power Outages. It is important to call number 811 before you plan on digging.

8. Planned Power Outages

Most planned power outages happen during normal business hours to minimize inconvenience to the customer. If repairs or maintenance cannot be finished within the scheduled time, electric companies will most likely schedule another Power Outage for the following day.

TYPES OF POWER OUTAGES

Permanent Fault: Contrary to the name, a permanent fault is not permanent. Faults are caused by unusual or unbalanced voltage or currents, or a stoppage in the flow. Permanent faults mean that the electrical issue cannot fix itself or reset without someone being sent to deal with the fault itself.

Brownout: During a Brownout, power is temporarily reduced. This means that power is not completely cut, but instead on a reduced power supply. Rolling Brownouts are used to reduce power by sections across the power grid to prevent the power grid from being overloaded.

Blackout: Blackouts are the most distressing of Power Outages. Recouping power can be extremely difficult because power stations can trip and shut off the grid. Black outs can last for hours, days or even weeks.

Failure to prepare is preparing to fail. Power outages during severe weather can be unpredictable and being caught in the middle of a Power Outage can even be deadly.

Power Outages may:

- Disrupt communications, water, and transportation
- Close services such as gas stations, grocery stores, ATMs, and banks
- Cause food spoilage and water contamination
- Prevent use of medical equipment
- Disrupt

HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF IN THE CASE OF A POWER OUTAGE

Preparing For a Power Outage

Flashlights and LED lanterns should be at the top of your list. Emergency flashlights that stay plugged in the wall and immediately activate in the event of a power outage are a great option. If you have a solar roof with battery backup you should be in good shape. For light power needs, a portable power bank may be the answer. While you will not be able to run your appliances from it, these can provide adequate power for some lights, charging your cell phone, etc. Another option is a generator. These require a fuel source such as gasoline or propane that can be dangerous and which you may not want to deal with.

No matter what you choose, maintenance is a consideration. Batteries in flash lights and power banks can last for several years, but remember to check the batteries and expiration dates as they all tend to leak, causing corrosion leading to inoperability. (Keeping a set of batteries in the freezer can greatly extend their life) Gasoline can expire within 3 to 6 months - Natural gas and Propane have no expiration date. Generators require maintenance (oil and spark plug changes) and annual starting to keep them fresh.

Most power outages only last a few hours, so if you can get by with flashlights and possibly a portable power station those will be least expensive and most convenient. For nighttime safety,

Know Your Medical Needs

It is important to speak with your medical provider about your medical devices that require electricity in the case of a Power Outage – this includes medication that requires refrigeration. Be informed on specific guidance of medications that are critical to life.

Food Storage

It is important to have an ample supply of nonperishable foods and water for every member of your household. According to the CDC, if the doors stay closed, food will stay safe for up to 4 hours in a refrigerator, 48 hours in a full freezer and 24 hours in a half-full freezer. Opening the doors can greatly reduce these times. Be sure to check that the temperature is 40 degrees or lower – Above 40 degrees can cause some food to spoil. One idea is to have a cooler with ice readily available for extra storage.

In conclusion

Always plan and be prepared in the event of a Power Outage-don't be caught by surprise. Have your power backup plan ready for whatever happens. These could be life-saving measures for you and your family.

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Looking at Lido... Seventy Years Ago

This month we are taking a look at Lido community life in the 1950s. The island was not totally built out at the time, so there were fewer residents, and many more were part-time residents. But the community was active, with plenty of opportunities to make friends and participate in unique activities. Two of these were the Lido Players and the Lido Food and Wine Society.

Many people may not realize that Lido Isle had its own theatrical group – actually two groups – starting in 1955. The first group, composed of about 80 adult members was called the Lido Players. Their dramatic pursuits were well publicized, even getting coverage in the LA Times. The productions took place in the Lido Clubhouse, where a small stage was sometimes used. The plays covered the whole range of dramatic literature. Many were locally written or embellished, while one of the Players' last performances was British playwright Alan Ayckbourn's How the Other Half Loves, performed in 1974.

The Lido Players were soon followed by the formation of the Junior Players in 1958. A group of 55 young people, age 13 and under, performed a number of plays such as "Little Hero of Holland", "Young Abe Lincoln" and "The Hole in the Sock". Both Lido dramatic groups were mentored in their early days by William Fucik. Fucik, a resident of 1503 Clay St. in Newport Beach, was no average drama coach. In addition to working with the Lido Isle groups, he directed summer stock drama programs, including the Belfry Players in Lake Geneva, WI, where he became a mentor for a young Harrison Ford. So you can imagine the quality of our local drama was high, and it was highly supported by the local community. Each Lido Isle resident was entitled to bring six friends to the productions, which filled out the audience nicely.

In addition to the dramatic pursuits of the time, men on the island formed the Lido Food and Wine Society around 1955. Since there was no Lido Isle Men's Club at this time, the F & W Society may have filled the need for a counterpart to the Lido Isle Women's Club. The F & W Society was particularly fond of themed dinners, such as a Swiss Night or the cuisine of Old Albion (Great Britain, to you and me). The British menu consisted of curry tomato soup, hearts of lettuce with Roquefort dressing, and roast beef with Yorkshire pudding, topped off with plum pudding and pomegranate sauce. The use of old family recipes seems to have been popular.

While the island has changed through the years, the need to get together with our fellow community members has not changed. It is fun to see, and possibly be inspired by, activities that were popular in the past. We are particularly fortunate that one of the best chroniclers of Orange County activities in the 1940s and 50s, photographer Wally Gerhardt, was a resident of Lido Isle at 234 Via Graziana. The collection of his photographs, archived by the library at UC Irvine and viewable online at Calisphere, is an incredible repository of information for all Lido Isle residents.

DON'T BECOME A CRIME VICTIM

Tips for Reducing Theft and Increasing Safety

As we start the new year, here are some helpful reminders from the Newport Beach Police Department, in reducing your chance of being a victim of a crime. Let's all work together to help preserve the quality of life at its finest in our community.

Always lock all doors and windows whenever you leave your home. Burglars often operate during the day, so don't forget to secure your home and set your alarm when you make a quick trip to the store or take the dog for a walk.

- Use timers to turn on a radio and lights. Timers are not just for vacation time, but should be used daily to keep your home well-lit and to give the appearance that someone is there.
- Avoid displaying electronic items and other valuables in places where they will be easily seen from your windows or doors. This includes your vehicles.
- Always keep your porch lights on from dusk to dawn using photocells and/or timers.
- Don't let home deliveries pile-up at your front door, they can attract a package thief or home burglar. Remember you have options to consider when ordering online or shipping packages:
 - o UPS and FedEx both offer customers the ability to customize the time and date of their delivery for when they will be home. A delivery date may be available with Amazon.
 - o Track your delivery online. Check your package's delivery status for an estimated delivery time and try to be home when it arrives.
 - o If you won't be home when the packages arrive, coordinate with a neighbor to pick them up & hang onto them until you can get home.
 - o Consider using in-store pick up or Amazon lockers if you anticipate that you won't be home when your packages are set to arrive.

When you leave for dinner or going out for the evening:

- Consider leaving some lights and the TV/music on that would imply (to anyone who might be watching your home) that someone is still inside while you are gone.
- Get a dog with a strong bark.
- Call the police to report anything suspicious. If you see an unfamiliar vehicle, suspicious person, or anything out of the ordinary when leaving your home, call NBPD's non-emergency line at 949-644-3717. Same protocol while at home or around Lido Isle.



Gone on vacation:

- Have a trusted neighbor keep an eye on your home and pick-up your newspapers and mail.
- Don't advertise that you are out of town on social media.
- Secure your garage door with a vacation bolt or pad lock and disable the remote access.

Shopping reminders:

- Do not to leave shopping bags (or any other property) in
 - o While you're at the mall or shopping center, carry your bags with you until you are ready to leave.
 - o You can also ask if the store will hold the items for you and let you pick them up when you are ready to head home.
 - o Once you get home, do not park your car outside your home with shopping bags left inside.
- Carry a purse with a zipper. Deter pickpockets by carrying your purse close to your body and keeping it zipped closed.
 - o If you carry a wallet, keep it in an inner coat pocket or front pants/shorts pocket.

Finally, it is long overdue to conduct another 'free' LICA selfdefense class at the Lido Isle Clubhouse. If you are interested, please email me at the address below. Remember... What you don't use... You lose... These techniques are perishable skills. This is a great way to brush up on your basic protocols of situational awareness, communication, use of distance, and at the last resort, effective self-defense techniques that work in the streets. The minimum age for this class is 10. Exercise is low to moderate. All depends how involved you are. Dress like you are going to the gym, run/walk, etc.

This is the Best Baked Oatmeal Contributed by Thomas O.

2 ripe bananas, sliced

1 ½ cup blueberries

¼ cup honey (or maple syrup)

1 ½ cup up uncooked quick or old fashion oats*

¼ cup chopped walnuts or pecans

½ tsp baking powder

34 tsp cinnamon

pinch of salt

1 ½ cup milk (or milk substitute)

1 large egg

2 tsp vanilla extract

3 TBSP ground flax seed

3 TBSP chia seeds

1. Preheat oven to 375F. Lightly spray 9 x 9" ceramic baking dish with cooking spray; set aside. 2. Arrange banana slices in single layer on bottom of ceramic dish. Sprinkle half the blueberries over bananas, add 1/4 tsp of cinnamon, 1 tbsp of honey, cover with foil. 3. Bake 15 minutes, until bananas get soft. 4. Meanwhile, in medium bowl, combine oats, half of nuts, baking powder, remaining cinnamon, flax seeds, chia seeds, and salt; stir together. 5. In separate bowl, whisk together remaining honey, milk, egg, and vanilla extract. 6. Remove bananas from oven, pour oat mixture over bananas and blueberries. 7. Pour milk mixture over oats and distribute

evenly. 8. Sprinkle remaining blueberries and walnuts over the top. 9. Bake oatmeal for about 30 minutes, or until the top is golden brown and oatmeal has set.

A Drive Into the Mystic

A few months ago, my husband and I read a travel blog hyping a place called the Inn at Newport Ranch located just north of Mendocino. Exploring CA's north coast had been on our bucket-list for some time (plus any place with Newport in the name must be good, right?) so we snagged a last minute, mid-week reservation, and off we went.

We cheated a bit and shortened the drive by flying to San Jose and renting a car. Google Maps told us that the quickest route from there was through Sonoma. After a lovely lunch in Healdsburg, we hopped on Highway 128, a winding two-lane road that meanders to the coast and terminates in a visual crescendo of soaring Redwoods and the sparkling blue Pacific. The beauty of that stretch of the drive was a totally unexpected treat and a destination unto itself.

After four hours of driving, we arrived at the Inn. Travel blogs describe Newport Ranch as a world class destination with exceptional outdoor adventure. It's true. We saw migrating whales, eaves-dropped on a family of quail and spied a rare formation of hawks soaring overhead, all while sipping our morning coffee.

Architecturally, the Inn is understated yet as grand as the 2000 acres of preserved land that surrounds it. Guest rooms incorporate giant exposed Redwoods, and the Main House has a two-story fireplace made from the full iron truss of an abandoned railroad bridge. Gourmet breakfast and happy hour are included with lodging. Lunch and dinner can be purchased, just let the Inn keeper know in advance if you'll be

joining. If you do decide to dine in, be sure to try the locally sourced oysters drizzled with chili butter!

For the kinetically inclined, a wide range of activities are available on property. We opted for the ATV

tour guided by an impressive self-described

mountain woman named Miki who hunts, is a professional sea urchin diver and lives (entirely) off-grid by choice. We picnicked, foraged for mushrooms, and planted a baby Redwood. Afterward, Miki dropped us at the Main House in time to watch the glorious sunset and search for the mythical Green Flash. If I must mention a negative, wifi is spotty. But that turned out to be a good thing for us.

Our units had walls of windows, Redwood trunks as supports


It is illegal & fines can be incurred for trees littering the city of Newport Beach or on Lido Isle Community Association property.

> Christmas Trees are scheduled to be picked up by CR&R from December 26th thru January 15th. Please remove all ornaments, lights & stands.

Cut the tree in half if it is over 6 feet tall. Place the tree curbside on your service day and CR&R tree collectors will come by in a separate truck to it pick up.


