Good Things are Happening on Lido!

Living the *Lido Dream* is more than a saying, it's a way of life. LICA works diligently to make sure it stays that way. In addition to day-today management and upkeep, several special projects are under way. Some take more time and effort than we would hope (Genoa Dock), but the outcome is always worth it.

Genoa/Nord Dock Replacement and Playground Repair Project


As most residents know, in late Summer 2022 the Genoa/Nord playground and dock were damaged by a car that sped north on Genoa, ran the stop sign, launched over the wall and hurled through the playground onto the dock, ending up nose first in the bay. Thankfully, there were no injuries, but some playground equipment and the entire dock (pier, ramp and float) were damaged beyond repair and had to be replaced.

Work on the park is complete, with new bollards added for safety. The final task is to rebuild the dock, which is anticipated in Summer of 2024. See summary below to better understand the long, complicated process and why it is taking so long. Special thanks to LICA President Ken Wirgler, and Board Members Camille Rizko and Buddy Richley for the many hours they volunteered (and continue to volunteer) to complete this project.

Confirm Insurance Coverage. Prior to moving forward with the replacement process, the Board worked with LICA's insurance carriers (Marine Property and Property) to file claims and recover costs. LICA's insurers in turn worked with the insurance company for the driver of the car. This process took several months.

Prepare Plans. Next, LICA engaged structural engineers to develop drawings and calculations to submit to the City for Approval in Concept (AIC). An approved AIC from the City would be required to initiate the Regulatory Path process with the Coastal Commission, Regulatory Water Board and Army Corps of Engineers.

Complete Environmental Studies. The AIC application required LICA to complete Eelgrass (a protected seagrass) and Caulerpa Taxifolia (a toxic algae) studies. The growth season for Eelgrass is March to October so the study could not commence until March 1. The studies took a month to complete. Fortunately, they went well, and no Eelgrass or toxic algae was found.



the California Regulatory Water Control Board and the California Coastal Commission on 6/2/23. It typically takes 6 to 12 months from submittal to approval from the various agencies. In early September LICA received a letter from the Coastal Commission asking several questions about our application. Responses to their questions were submitted within days. There will likely be several iterations of questions and responses with the Coastal Commission - which is typical.

Initiate Construction. Once approved by the state and federal agencies, LICA will bid out the project and initiate construction upon award of a bid. The construction process is estimated to take 3 to 4 months with final completion anticipated in Summer of 2024.

Playground Equipment and Safety Bollards. The playground equipment damaged by the car accident was replaced a few months



ago and a new up to code merrygo-round (replacing the old one) was installed in early September.

City Approval. The AIC application was submitted to the City in late March and the City Harbor Commission approved the AIC on 4/12/23. After more questions, delays and other minor details required by the City, the paperwork was completed on 5/31/23.

Nine new traffic bollards were also installed at the Genoa/Nord intersection; five bollards on one side of the large tree and four on the other side.

NBPD Neighborhood Watch: Mail Thieves Are Using Glue Traps

Hello Neighbors,

SECURITY

I wanted to pass along the most recent news from the Newport Beach Police Department, Neighborhood Watch Program.

MAIL THEFT AWARENESS

One of NBPD's Property Crimes Detectives asked to pass along some recent information on the mail thefts reports he's been seeing so we can try to prevent more of these crimes. Here's what he wants you to know:

Mail thieves are after your identity and your money. They target residential curbside mailboxes, multi-unit residential mailboxes, and publicly accessible blue U.S. Postal Service boxes in an attempt to collect your personal information, checks, and cash. They typically work in the late night and early morning hours.

Recently, we have seen numerous thefts involving publicly accessible US Postal Service drop boxes where thieves are using glue traps or glue-covered items to "fish" for mail. They use the victim's personal information to open lines of credit, commit other crimes, or to sell to other criminals. The thieves also alter and forge checks, then cash the checks and pocket the money.

To protect yourself from becoming a victim of mail theft:

- Collect your mail daily, preferably, as soon as it is delivered.
- Avoid mailing any item containing your personal information, checks, or cash. If you must mail those items, avoid placing them in residential mailboxes or publicly accessible US Postal Service drop boxes, especially if they show signs of tampering, such as a sticky substance on or around the mail slot. Instead, hand mail to US Postal Service employees or use a secure US Postal Service Facility.
- If you suspect you are the victim of mail theft, contact your financial institution and secure your account immediately. Then, call and report the crime to the Newport Beach Police Department.

DISTRACTION THEFTS + SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

We continue to get reports of distraction thefts occurring in our city. For more information on those trends, you can check out the details *here* and *here*. With an increase in this type of activity, it is important to maintain situational awareness to avoid being the victim of a pickpocket or distraction theft.

Here are some recommendations for practicing situational awareness and deterring pickpockets:

- As you go about your daily tasks, pay attention to the people, objects, vehicles and events happening around you.
- Limit distractions whenever possible.
- Be aware when you are approached by a stranger or when someone gets into your personal space.
- Trust your instincts if someone or something is making you uncomfortable.
- Lock your vehicle whenever you step outside of it even if you will be standing nearby (i.e. fueling up at the gas station, etc.). Remember that it just takes a split second while your back is turned for someone to grab your purse, wallet, cell phone or other valuables.
- Never leave your keys in the ignition when you are not in the car. Take them out of the vehicle and lock

- Valuables should be stored either where you can keep an eye on them or where they cannot be easily seen or accessed by others.
- Whenever you are out and about, remember to not lose sight of your personal belongings.

Finally, you can help prevent incidents like this from happening to others by passing this information along to your family, friends and neighbors. You may not find yourself in a situation with a pickpocket or scammer, but there's a chance that you know someone who will - if they haven't already.

Stay safe and please pay attention, especially on Halloween, and have a nice October.

New Clubhouse Flagpole

Recall that the historic flagpole located at the Clubhouse broke in half during high winds last winter. The City has agreed to allow LICA to rebuild the

flagpole to its original height of 59 feet instead of

limiting it to the current maximum allowed 35 feet. Flagpoles of this height must be custom made, with proper engineering calculations to ensure stability. The old flagpole was made of steel and eventually gave way to rust. The new pole will be made of a rust resistant heavyduty polyvinyl material that should have a lifespan even greater than the last one which was erected in 1929. The contract between LICA and the flagpole manufacturer was approved by the LICA Board at their meeting on September 20th. Fabrication will take 4-6 months and installation is anticipated in Spring of 2024.

Enhanced Holiday Lighting and Christmas Tree

Be on the lookout for enhanced lighting and a giant new Christmas tree on Lido this holiday season. New electrical outlets and wiring near the bridge, in the parkway at the island entrance and at the Genoa/Soud park was recently installed to ensure a very sparkly Christmas. Be sure to attend the Annual Tree Lighting hosted by LICA and island clubs! Details to come.

Phase 2 of Clubhouse Remodel

Final touches on the plans for a (much needed) new roof, updated Board Room and new outside landscaping are nearly complete and work will begin soon to finish the Clubhouse beautification. And the good news is these items have already been budgeted! In the meantime, be sure to stop by during drop-in hours to enjoy the always amazing view of the bay.


LIDO LITTLES TRICK OR TREATING

Evacuating? Don't forget the 6 P's of Packing

In the past year, disasters (wildfires, lava flows, extreme storms and flooding, threats of tsunamis and strong aftershocks, air and water contamination) have prompted voluntary and mandatory evacuations.

Imagine that you are ordered to quickly evacuate your home on Lido or perhaps a second home in the mountains or desert or even a hotel on an exotic vacation. What would you pack? The best time to consider this question is not when the order comes but NOW. Kate Hutton, from LA's Emergency Management Department, suggests six categories of things to pack. They're called the 6 P's.

1. People and Pets. Your family members – human and otherwise – should be your first priority when you evacuate. If you have a pet, bring what it will need on the road and in a shelter -- food, water, bowls, medication, leash, crate, toys and proof of updated vaccinations.

2. Papers and Phone numbers. Bring passports, birth certificates, your marriage license, property documents and proof of medical insurance etc. as well important phone numbers. Rather than carrying hard copies, it's more practical to store photos of these on a memory stick or in 'the cloud'.

3. Prescriptions. Pack prescription and OTC medication as well as eyeglasses, contact lenses and solution. A first aid kit is a must. And remember your toothbrushes and toothpaste. For babies and toddlers, you'll need diapers, wipes, a stroller and comfort toys.

4. Pictures and Personal items. Discuss beforehand what each family member would take if they ever need to evacuate. If possible, have these in an accessible location. The time to choose and search for these items is NOT when you receive the order to evacuate.

5. Personal computers/smart Phones are essential for accessing critical information and staying in contact. Don't forget extra batteries and the correct chargers.

6. Plastics. Bring your ID, insurance, credit and debit cards. You'll also need cash in case ATM's aren't working.



Old Sale

Lido's Fabled Intersection

Newport Boulevard and Via Lido. The intersection might not resonate with the average person, but it is the lifeblood of Lido Isle residents. We all spend days of our lives sitting in traffic and observing this intersection and the stores which beckon us into Lido Village. The Newport and Via Lido intersection has been home to banks, restaurants, hairdressers, real estate offices and currently, a high-end clothing store and non-descript office building. But when a considerate neighbor recently showed Old Isle the adjacent lovely 1948 photo of this intersection, the original magic of the area was apparent. But while the fantastic view down the 1948 Via Lido beckons with yachts peacefully floating in the distance, the closer picture of Vincent's drugstore at the intersection itself exudes unmistakable glamour, and this incredible store deserves to be remembered.

Lonnie R. Vincent opened the eponymous Vincent's Drug Store on December 1, 1948, supposedly during an earthquake (there was a 6.0 quake centered in Desert Hot Springs on 12/4/1948, so taking some artistic liberty, apparently!). The store carried a large and diverse selection of merchandise ranging from TVs to parakeets, wading pools to underwear, and dog food to charcoal briquettes. The store was also home to a 20-seat soda fountain/grill, a jewelry and watch repair service, and of course, a prescription drug store. Vincent had high hopes for the store, and creative ideas such as long store hours (8am to 11pm) and unique merchandise display made for a special shopping experience. (Vincent actually patented an idea for a display cabinet for the store, where merchandise was attractively arrayed for customers, and his cabinet seems to be pictured in one of the photos here.)

Press reports of the time stated that Vincent's was the most glamorous drugstore in the southwest. Hollywood celebrities liked to hang out at Vincent's soda fountain, and you could have seen Ray Milland, Dick Powell, June Allyson, Eleanor Parker, Joey Bishop, Edgar Bergen, Rock Hudson, Claire Trevor, John Wayne and Johnny Mercer drinking strawberry phosphates or other delights of the time. Area residents also would drop into Vincent's for a snack after seeing a movie at the Lido Theatre.

The chief pharmacist at Vincent's was a man named Dean Reavie. In 1959, he and two partners, Bob Ramsay and Max Pelletier, bought out Lonnie Vincent's shares in the drugstore, and for three weeks, all went well. Then, one morning a new employee started the store's grill, using eight burners when only one was needed, and the kitchen caught on fire. It was thought that the fire had been contained, but it soon became apparent that the fire was smoldering in the attic, and before long, the whole store was destroyed. Reavie was able to retrieve his prescription files and soon built a shack on the corner to continue serving his customers.

But Reavie was not a man to give up, and soon he and the Griffith Company designed a state-of-the-art, 5100-square-foot drugstore to be built on the other side of the Lido Theatre. That store opened in 1960, with a ribbon-cutting featuring Hollywood actress Nanette Fabray (1920-2018), and that store is still serving the community as Via Lido Drugs, the design of which has withstood the test of time incredibly well.


Dean Reavie retired from Via Lido Drugs in 1988 and continued as a valued member of the Newport Beach community until his death in 2012. Although he does not appear to have been a Lido Isle resident, the Lido Isle community owes him and Lonnie Vincent a debt of gratitude for their wonderful drug and everything stores that have served Lido Isle so well.

- 1. Plant Natives. California natives are best planted in the fall when the weather is still warm and there is a better chance of rain-the water will help your new plants get established.
- 2. Plant Ornamental Grasses & Rushes. A few good choices for ornamental grasses in Southern California include slender veldt grass, evergreen fountain grass, lomandra, and evergreen Eulalia grass.
- 3. Transplant Agaves & Other Succulents. If you have agave pups (new plants sprouting from the mother agave plant), consider yourself lucky. You now have free plants you can separate from the mother plant and replant in another location of your garden.



- 4. Plant Bulbs, Corms & Tubers. You can plant bulbs in Southern California now through December.
- 5. Adjust Watering Schedules. When fall and winter rains begin watering schedules should be adjusted.
- 6. Let Summer Flowers Go to Seed. If you leave spent flowers on the plant, they will go to seed—a welcome fall and winter snack for birds.
- 7. Harvest Pumpkins. You'll know a pumpkin is ready to harvest when the rind hardens and the pumpkin has reached the desired color.
- 8. Fertilize Plants One Last Time. This is a good month to apply the last round of fertilizer for the the year.




9. Plant Cool Season Herbs. For fall and winter cooking, plant anise, arugula, borage, chervil, chives, cilantro, dill, fennel, garlic chives, lavender, lemon grass, lovage, parsley, rosemary, and sorrel.

10. Get Ready for Early Darkness. Fall back Sunday, November 5th!

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
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FULL SLATE OF Fun Ahead This Season

PICKLEBALL VS TENNIS WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Tennis and Pickleball History

Tennis can be traced back to 12th century France, while pickleball was invented in the mid-20th century in the U.S. The start of tennis is rooted in religious ceremonies and games played by monks. It wasn't until the 18th century that tennis became a competitive sport with documented rules. On the other hand, pickleball was created as a backyard game in the late 1960s for families in Washington state.

Pickleball Scoring vs. Tennis Scoring

Pickleball vs. Tennis is also different when it comes to scoring. Tennis scores go love, 15, 30, 40 and game. If both players have 40, that's called a deuce, and the next player to score two points wins the game. For pickleball, scoring goes 0, 1, 2, 3, etc. Often, the first player or team to reach 11 (win by two) wins. In tennis, every ball in play results in a point. In pickleball, you must be serving to gain a point.

How Do Serve Rules Differ?

In tennis, serves can be made overhand, and players have two chances to get a successful serve in. In pickleball, the serve must be made underhand, and players only get one chance for a successful serve.

So... Pickleball or Tennis?

While pickleball is often billed as the fastest-growing sport in the world, it still has a ways to go to catch up to tennis. Within the U.S., there are approximately 4.8M pick-leball players vs. 22M tennis players. And if we look at social media followers, tennis has a significant lead with about 16.4M vs. 1.5M for pickleball. Desite this, pickleball is a much lower-impact sport, so is more suitable for anyone worried about their knees and hips. Pickleball involves much less running around, so can be enjoyed by anyone, regardless of their physical fitness or strength.

FRIENDLY REMINDERS

Lido Isle has a reservation system which allows you to secure a tennis court, basketball court or pickle ball court up to two weeks in advance. Go to Lidoisle.org to create an account. Additionally, the new LICA rules regarding the reservation system and the proper use of the pickleball court do apply. (Frequent no-shows after reserving; no music is permitted; per-family limits on court reservations) There is currently a trial period and LICA is still receiving reports of LICA rules being ignored.

Pickleball is ONLY permitted on the designated pickleball/basketball court on Via Jucar. Pickleball is NOT permitted on the tennis courts nor the Via Jucar practice area (hitting wall).

Courts are first-come/first-serve but must be relinquished immediately to a resident who has made a reservation. Recreation courts are for residents and their guests only.

Keys for the courts are for residents only and a resident must be present when their key is used to access the courts. No "borrowed" keys are to used by non-residents.

Security cameras are installed on the sport courts and backboard areas, please only use the courts for their intended purposes and smile as you may be on camera.

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


